Just a reminder, that a majority of the local units in District 37 are required to update their bylaws this year. Five units have completed the review process. A handful more are in the finishing stages. Has your PTA begun the process? Please remember that bylaws need to be reviewed, submitted to the district director, posted, and approved by your

general membership. If your PTA wants to make changes to the number or duties of officers that must be completed before the nominating committee can slate those positions, otherwise, the old bylaws will still be in effect.

Please plan ahead! It takes about a week for the director's review and approval. Then the bylaws must be posted for 30 days prior to the vote at the general membership meeting. There are fifty nine units that must complete this process this year. If approved bylaws don't exist, the *Illinois PTA Bylaws for Local PTA/PTSA Units* are in effect for your PTA.

Please keep in mind that with so many units needing their bylaws updated, the approval process may take longer due to the sheer quantity being submitted. We are offering a two part workshop to allow PTAs to become comfortable with their bylaws and complete them in a less intimidating manner. PTAs who attend the two workshops should see a quicker review process and approval due to the understanding that they gain by attending the training.

Lastly, the Illinois PTA 109th Annual Convention will be held on March 11-14, 2011 at the Marriott in Schaumburg, IL. Friday will feature a vendor exhibits and the awards event. There will be leadership training opportunities at various times throughout the weekend. Convention is an appropriate use of PTA funds. Please plan to attend and have your PTA represented. IS YOUR BUDGET ON TRACK?

By now, the fall activities of your PTA are in full swing. It is time to take stock of where you are in relation to your adopted budget. So, let's take the time to outline a few areas that you can use to measure your progress:



- **Membership:** have you developed a strong message to send to your school community about the importance of being a voice for *every* child? How close are you to reaching your membership goal for the year? Are you continuing to *ask* people to join your PTA-- either through your newsletters, website or personal contacts? Have you written to past PTA members reminding them that the new membership year is here?
- **Fund raising projects:** are the activities you have completed reaching the projected income levels? Have you added any new activities to raise funds? How do those activities align with your goals as an association? Is your community supporting your goals? Are you evaluating the programs and projects you undertake?
- **Checks and balances:** do you have a check and balance system in place to review the regularly presented financial reports? Is someone other than the treasurer reviewing the bank statements before they are reconciled? Do PTA members have an opportunity to ask questions about the financial reports? Do you know who to ask for advice when you are not sure about how to handle special circumstances, like returned checks or undistributed items?

you are not familiar with those tools, please plan to attend workshops offered by District 37 and the councils within the District.

Just a reminder, that all 501 c 3 associations are required to file some informational return with the Internal Revenue Service annually. This report is due by the 15th day of the 5th month following the close of your fiscal year. So, if your fiscal year ended June 30, 2010, your report will be due to the IRS by 11/15/10. Should you need further information about reporting, please check the *Money Matters* course materials or the IRS website.

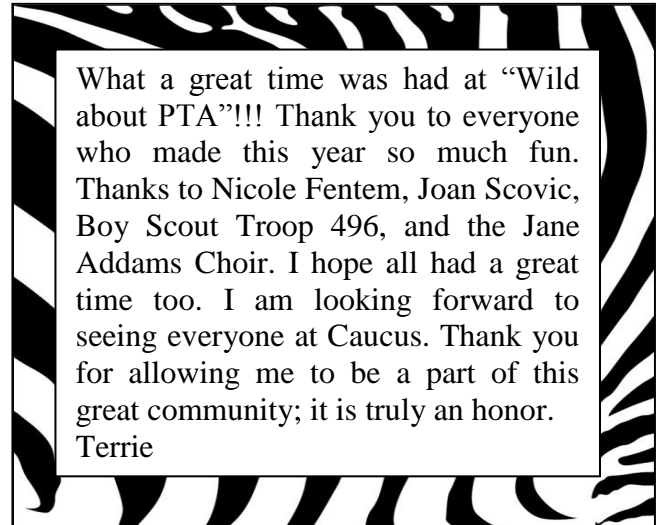

Texting While Driving: Parents' Role in Prevention

Distracted driving has become such a safety threat that the U.S. Department of Transportation called a summit to address the issue September 30. One of the results was a DOT promise to work with Congress to:

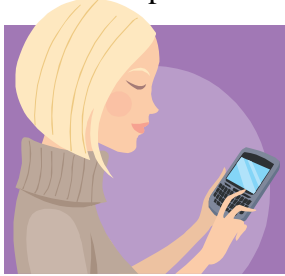
- Permanently restrict the use of cell phones and other electronic devices in rail operations
- Ban text messaging and restrict use of cell phones by truck drivers and interstate bus operators
- Ban school bus drivers convicted of texting while driving from holding commercial driver's licenses.

Federal action won't solve the problem overnight. But drivers and parents of drivers can act now to reduce the dangers of distracted driving, especially **texting while driving**.

The problem of texting while driving is especially critical among teen drivers. National Highway Traffic Safety Administration data shows that the age group with the greatest proportion of distracted drivers was the under-20 age group. David Melton, director of transportation consulting services for the Liberty Mutual Research Institute for Safety, said

the first thing parents can do is discuss texting with their kids. Do they know just how much their kids text now? Melton said parents should look at the phone bill and bring the issue of texting while driving to their teens’ attention.



The most important thing parents can do—which not many parents are doing, apparently—is setting a good example for safe

driving, Melton said. A Liberty Mutual Insurance survey showed that 69 percent of parents of teen drivers practice at least two dangerous or distracting behaviors while driving. Nearly half perform at least three distracting behaviors such as texting. Dads are especially guilty, as 75 percent of fathers surveyed admitted they were guilty of at least two distracting behaviors while driving.

“Young kids have seen us exhibit bad behaviors,” Melton said. “No matter what we tell them about safe driving how can they believe we’re serious about it? We must become good examples. Teens get safe driving examples from many sources but no one more than mom or dad.”

Parents can also encourage driving safety by making cell phone use practical, Melton said. Some tips on **safe driving and cell phone use**:

- When you know your teen might be driving, don’t just call to visit.
- Before starting the content of a call, ask the teen if she is driving. If she is, tell her to pull over and call her back.
- If you need to talk to your teen, make the call short. Don’t have emotional conversations or make critical decisions over the cell phone.

Tools are available for parents to promote safe driving. The Students Against Destructive Decisions group offers a [safe driving contract](#) that parents and their children can sign to encourage safe driving.

Melton encourages parents to perform a **“commentary drive,”** an exercise with their teen drivers to reinforce the dangers of texting while

driving. The parent should drive with the teen in the passenger seat and take an unfamiliar route. The teen should start texting and, at the same time, describe two things:

- what he or she sees
- how he or she would respond.

Parents should pay attention to the potential hazards the child is missing—a hidden driveway, children playing near the street, etc.—and point them out to the teen.

“Everybody thinks they can multitask. Research proves we’re not as adept as we think,” Melton said.

PTAs can encourage driving safety by linking parents with these tips and safe driving tools, Melton said. They can also advocate “intolerance” for texting while driving and other distracted driving behaviors exhibited by school bus drivers or other employees on school business.

“Most experts agree that you make more decisions while driving than at any other time of the day. To slow down, to speed up involves multiple decisions and you make hundreds and hundreds of decisions every mile,” Melton said. “If any of those decisions are made or not made while distracted they can indeed lead to an emergency where you may get out of it or you may not.”

What about driver education and training? Melton said there really isn’t much more education that can be done, as safe driving training is fairly prevalent and readily available. The key is making safe driving a habit and an expectation.

“I really believe that people know how to drive safely but they choose not to,” he said. “If they choose not to, you don’t have a training problem you have a management problem. And in a family guess who the managers are? Mom and dad.”

FBI Offers Free Program on Internet Safety for Youth

The Federal Bureau of Investigations is offering a free program aimed at keeping students safe online. The FBI-SOS (Safe Online Surfing) Internet Challenge provides internet safety information to students in third through eighth grade. (High school materials should be available by the end of the year.)

The FBI-SOS program features web-based quizzes aimed at promoting online safety and cyber citizenship. Topics, which vary based on grade levels, include cyberbullying, protecting personal information, online predators, and copyright and fair use.

To participate, teachers or administrators need to register the school at <http://fbi-sos.org>, and then students can register under their school name. Students take a grade-specific pre-quiz, followed by a “Scavenger Hunt” and then a post-quiz. The Scavenger Hunt sends students to pre-screened websites to search for valuable information. Awards include a trophy for the highest-scoring schools. For more information about the program, visit <http://fbi-sos.org>.

In Illinois, Public Act 095-0869 (<http://www.ilga.gov/legislation/publicacts/fulltext.asp?Name=095-0869>) mandates internet safety education for grades 3-12.

Fairview PTA in Hoffman Estates promoted the following PTA object last year: To bring into closer relation the home and the school, that parents and teachers may cooperate intelligently in the education of children and youth.

Here is what they did and how they accomplished it:

Our enrichment committee for the first time hosted "Summer Enrichment Night". This well attended inaugural event took place May 2010. In conjunction with the PTA and Teachers a program was put together to outline the importance of continuing the education experience thru the dog days of summer. All too often we hear about how much students forget from the time they leave school in June until they return in late August. To combat this downward trend the PTA joined forces with the teachers to create an evening where parents attended mini-class presentations for grade appropriate topics. The staff put together presentations on the importance of reading, writing and math and introduced concepts to parents to make these topics fun and keep students active thru out the summer. These breakout sessions allowed for parents to ask questions and learn more about the education process. There were parents attending that we had never seen before.

While parents attended these mini-lectures their children spent an entertaining evening in the gym. The gym was setup in various sections. The reading corner where an adult volunteer read out loud a children's book, board game corner where checkers, chess, scrabble and other games that required thinking but were fun, the gym teacher held several sessions on health and fitness. She showed the kids how to stay in shape and encouraged them to stay active over the summer.

Education Nation Scorecard — An Important Tool for Parents

National PTA partnered with NBC News, GreatSchools, the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation, and other organizations to create the Education Nation Scorecard. The tool provides useful, clearly understandable information about performance at individual schools, in districts, states and for the nation as a whole.

Parents can use the tool to look up their child's school and to see how it is doing compared to schools in the community, district, state, and nation. Parents can also use it to view graduation rates, NAEP scores, and to see if your state has adopted the [Common Core State Standards](#), among other things. More importantly, parents can use this information to have conversations with their child's teacher to find out how they can support their child's education. Parents can find a list of questions on the scorecard under "What Can I Do?" to help start the conversation with your child's teacher or principal.
